



We would like to thank everyone who did help during the incident, both undergraduates and alumni.

Media throughout the country recognized our efforts, and we have received commendations from IMH and brothers everywhere. Locally, the Interfraternity Council and the State College Police Department both praised our efforts, improving our relations in both areas. Other fraternities within the Penn State Greek system also recognized our efforts as being positive for all fraternities, locally and nationally.

THE INAUGURAL KAPPA SIG STREET HOCKEY CHALLENGE

Last winter, Craig Pozsonyi '99, Ryan Millan '99 and I were brainstorming to determine the type of philanthropic event we would organize for the fall semester. Without any hesitation, we realized that Penn State was in dire need of a good street hockey tournament. The sport is growing tremendously, and we knew we would receive an excellent response. On October 10, 1998, our vision came to life as we closed off the Alpha-Delta parking lot, drew the chalk lines, and dropped the puck — I mean ball — on the first game. The tournament was sanctioned by USA Hockey InLine, which is a nonprofit organization providing insurance and other help to promote the sport. Alumnus Michael Hooks '93 dedicated much of his time to help referee and organize



the day's events. Several local businesses also got in on the action as sponsors for the tournament. In the end, Sigma Phi Epsilon won the trophy as the tournament's champion and the Centre County Children and Youth Services received \$612 from the brothers of Kappa Sigma. We are looking forward to the Second Annual Street Hockey Challenge, which will take place early next fall. If you'd like to get involved, contact the chapter house.

Due to the riot and many other alcohol-related incidents, the local police departments, the Liquor Control Board, and the Pennsylvania State Police have stepped up their efforts to curb underage drinking. Every weekend, law enforcement is highly visible throughout the borough, especially in the vicinity of this summer's riot. Their presence has proven positive for the community and the chapter. Incidents involving apartment buildings and vandalism of our chapter house have been greatly reduced, while the usual problems seen on weekend nights throughout town have also decreased.

As a chapter, we want to keep our relations with local law enforcement on a positive note. This semester, we plan to have a local officer out for dinner. We hope she or he will be able to help us with our risk management policies as well as with ways we may be able to improve our community relations.

This past May, Alpha-Delta prematurely lost one of our own. Curtis Lee Huber '89 was killed instantly when a large rock fell from a mountain and landed on the truck Curt was driving. Curtis was living on Saba, an island in the Caribbean (near St. Martin's), where he owned and operated a dive shop.

Anyone who was a part of the house during the time Curtis was there certainly will feel a great sense of loss. Curt's infectious laughter and carefree attitude will not be forgotten. While at Kappa Sigma, Curtis was always active, serving as social chair and Grand Master of Ceremonies as well as other offices. After graduating with a bachelor's degree in industrial psychology, he moved to California, where he worked as a representative for Gallo Wines, and as a pharmaceutical salesperson.

Curt was an avid surfer and a master scuba diver. He spent the last few years of his life doing what he truly loved, diving. Curt died less than a week before his 31st birthday, and four months before he was due to be

married. In addition to his fiancée, Curt is survived by his mother and father (Parents' Weekend dance champions) Ken and Maggie Huber, and a brother, Shawn '96, also an Alpha-Delta Kappa Sig.

Curt was a man who truly personified the Star & Crescent, which was read at his funeral. Many friends and brothers attended. Should you ever find yourself in Saba, ask any of the natives about Curt, and they will welcome you. The day Curt died, the Dutch flag flew at half mast throughout the island (the first time this honor was afforded an American); the government has erected a memorial to Curt. Curtis truly loved Saba and the islanders loved him. At his memorial service, everyone on the island attended. He will be missed by the Sabans, his family and our Order.
