Kappa Sigma Returning to Penn State!



Fortieth Reunion of Joe Paterno's First Team as Penn State's Head Coach Boasts Many Kappa Sigma Alumni

1966 Team Honored During September 2006 Game Against Youngstown State University

Building a Reunion for Paterno's 1966 Team, His First as Penn State's Head Coach

Nothing builds a friendship like shared experiences. For seven Kappa Sigma brothers from the '67 and '68 classes, those experiences came in the fraternity house and on the football field and resulted in friendships worth maintaining. Last September, five of the seven Kappa Sigs who played on Joe Paterno's first Penn State football team in 1966 got together with the other members of that team for a 40th reunion. They recalled those shared experiences and renewed those friendships that grew from bonds formed in the locker room, on the fields, and at the Kappa Sigma house.

Mike Irwin '67 and Warren Hartenstine '67 were the instigators behind the reunion, which took place September 15-17, during the weekend of the Youngstown State football game at Penn State. Mike and Warren were teammates and roommates, and have remained friends over the years. When they got together

with a group of their teammates and fraternity brothers for the Blue/White game in April 2004, then again at the Orange Bowl in 2005, Mike suggested they plan a reunion for the 1966 football team, which was the first to play with Paterno as head coach.

Warren took the reins from there, working with the universi-

ty and making other arrangements. About half of the team made it back to campus for the events, which included a cocktail reception, a catered tailgate party, and their intro-

duction to the crowd during half-time.

In addition to Irwin and Hartenstine, the other Kappa Sigma men who played on the '66 team were: Jim Weaver '69, Tim

Montgomery '67, Tom Stuart '67, Joe Zelinsky '68 and Joe Kaliszewski '69.

Joe Paterno, who turned 80 last December, and his wife, Sue, put in an appearance at the Friday evening cocktail reception thanks to another Kappa Sigma brother, **George 'Mac' Middlemas '68**. "He was instrumental in getting Joe to come," Mike said, explaining that George knows the Paternos well. "He visited them at their home earlier in the day and urged them to come to the gathering."

Coach Paterno's Unique Motivational Methods Benefit Kappa Sigma Football Players

Warren described that "Coach Paterno was his typical self at the reunion, teasing his former players, 'We beat some pretty good teams that year; considering you guys had no talent!" Sue Paterno popped up to tell attendees that her husband can remember "every play of every game when you guys played in the order they were run, but he can't remember his own kids' birthdays."

"Paterno's an amazing guy," Mike said.
"His memory is remarkable." Warren agreed, relating a story about his wife, an airline flight attendant, meeting Paterno on a flight some 22 years after Warren had last seen him. "She wouldn't normally do this, but she introduced herself during landing in San Francisco, saying that her husband had played for him. He saw her name tag and asked, 'What is Warren doing now?'" But that's not the end of the story! "Two years later, we were in a receiving line without name tags and when we reached Joe, he greeted us both by our first names."

Mike and Warren also are in agreement that Paterno knows his players as individuals. Mike considers that trait one of Paterno's strengths as a coach: He knows which tactics get the best from each player. Warren said, "He stimulates people to exceed their own expectations. He goads you, harasses you, compliments you—whatever it takes—to make you get more than you ever expect of yourself."

Warren noted that Paterno has a way of making his players feel a sense of personal responsibility, "every win was ours, and every loss was ours, too." He thinks this gives Paterno's players a unique perspective: The motivation and ability to consistently meet and exceed expectations. "You look more deeply at opportunities and understand what the outcome could be if you're willing to

work hard enough."

Both men also believe that "Joe Paterno was what it took for Penn State to move from a solid program to a nationally-ranked program," as Warren put it. In his 41 years as head coach at Penn State, Paterno has led the team to two National Championships (1982 and 1986) and five undefeated seasons (1968, 1969, 1973, 1986 and 1994). He has had 21 finishes in the Top 10 national rankings and has the highest bowl win percentage of any coach ever.

Mike said he enjoyed the way the State College media saluted the 1966 team. "They called us 'the forgotten team'," he said, noting that the media interviewed a different team member for special features in the game day edition prior to each game this past football season. "It was interesting to hear how each of us had a different perspective on the season."

Mike also recalled the biggest event of his football career, which happened his sophomore yearæthe same year he joined Kappa Sigma. "We played Ohio State in Columbus, and they were ranked second in the nation. We were a mediocre 3-4 team. We beat them 27-0. (Former Nittany Lion Head Coach) Rip Engle said that was one of the top ten games ever played by a Penn State team." Today, that game is known as "The Greatest Game in Penn State Football History."

Teammates as Brothers and Roommates

Warren and Mike lived together in the dorms for their first two years at Penn State. It was during their second year that Warren suggest ed that they join a fraternity. "The seven of

us from the football team wanted to leave the dorms, but we didn't want to get an apartment, so we decided on Kappa Sigma," Warren explains. The seven were initiated together and five days later Warren became president of the chapter. A year later, he became president of the

Interfraternity Council that brought the Supremes, Bill Cosby, and the Temptations to campus. "He was more involved in politics than football," Mike says of his former roommate.

"Paterno told me that he felt I could do more for Penn State as president of the IFC than on the field, but then nicknamed me 'Governor' when I was 11 minutes late for practice—no one *was ever* late for practice—when I had a meeting with the governor of Pennsylvania at President Walker's house." Warren recalled. "Serving Penn State or not, I became 'The Governor' from then on."

Mike recalled that his first roommates in the Kappa Sig house were teammates Tim Montgomery and Joe Kaliszewski, as well as brother **Tom McNulty**. "One night I came back to the room to discover they had moved my bed into the hall," he said. "I guess they didn't like my snoring."

Mike was grateful for the September reunion and the opportunity to renew friendships. "I reconnected with my fraternity brothers, and had a lot of fun doing it," he said.

Warren noted that Paterno's contract has been extended for the next two years. "He says he plans to coach until it's not fun any more," Warren explained. Mike says he's glad Paterno has stuck around, if for no other reason, "otherwise no one would remember us—his first team!" Kappa Sigma would. You'll always be remembered—and welcome—here.
