Kappa Sig Brings in \$78,771 FOR THE KIDS Chapter and Gamma Gamma Sigma Celebrate Record-Breaking THON

It is a scene like none other. For those of you who have been part of THONs past, you know.

Where else can you go to experience the energy of a truly altruistic group of college students — complete with water pistols, balloons, games, plungers, hula hoops, crazy socks, line dances, pep rallies, inspirational speeches from some of Penn State's most notable personalities, incredibly choreographed performances and 46 hours of no sleep?

And it is all ... FOR THE KIDS ... to continue Penn State's 37-year tradition of saving children from the grip of pediatric cancer.

Thanks to our chapter's yearlong canning and fundraising efforts with Gamma Sigma Sigma, we contributed \$78,771.47 toward Penn State's \$13,343.517.33 total that will be

given to the Four Diamonds Fund at Penn State Hershey Children's Hospital.

On Saturday afternoon, Jay Paterno former assistant football coach and son of Joe Paterno — paid a visit to the THON dancers. He summarized the impact of pediatric cancer

in a very powerful way. "A couple of weeks ago, I was in Hershey and toured the children's hospital. The woman who runs the Four Diamonds Fund was asked what the survival rate was. She said, "We save four out of every five children here." I couldn't bear to be without one of my five kids. Think about that. That is why you are here ... because we are going to make it five out of every five ...

Every year you do this, we are knocking at the door a little more and a little more. In the very near future, Penn State students are going to kick in that damn door."

As the crowd erupted in screams and applause, parents could be seen holding tightly to those THON children who have embraced the hearts of our Greek community at Penn State. It is the power of hope ... hope for one more day, week, month or year ... that our chapter is helping to give to families across

the state. We are fortunate to be part of such a life-giving effort at Penn State that does, in fact, redefine the possibilities.

Also speaking to the dancers was Penn State's newly appointed football coach, James Franklin. "Everybody thinks that what makes

According to **Wes Link '55**, 2013 was not his favorite year. While it was a productive year for business, he lost his wife of 55 years. "Barbara was a Kappa Sig Sweetheart," he explains. "I met her at the house. This has been a tough year. You just don't realize everything you have to handle when your spouse passes away. Barbara was a school teacher, but she took care of a lot of things at home. I have great respect for all that she did now that I have to do it myself."

A manufacturer's rep providing specialty values to the Air Force and Navy for aerospace application, Wes has continued to manage a successful business over the past several years. In the past six weeks alone, he has had requests for over 1,400

quotes due to new products required by the military. "I used to work 14 or 16 hours a day," he admits. "Just recently, I retired half of my business. I already feel the stress lowering."

One bright spot in 2013 was PSU football. Having missed only three home football games since 1972, Wes was determined to keep his trend going. "While health issues make it impossible for me to see every game," he says, "I am at every tailgate without fail. Fortunately, the brothers who tailgate next to me have a 42-inch HD TV, so I don't miss a thing. I often see brothers from the '60s at games. And, due to our successful centennial celebration, I have become good friends with some from the '90s."

This Jackson Man and regular alumni contributor also has a renovated home to enjoy. "When we lost Barbara, my daughters were so helpful. I could not have made it through without them. They even helped me convert the home into a man cave, which I am enjoying."

When asked about his life with Kappa Sig, Wes had this to say: "A few years ago, I was asked to comment on what Kappa Sig means to me. My answer hasn't changed. I met my wife at Kappa Sig, and from that relationship I have my children and grandchildren. I owe my whole life to Kappa Sig."


